Course Description	:	Setting of Southeast Asian in past colonial and Cold War period; emergence of regionalization and subsequent creation of Fhrciatrein of Southeast Asian Nations "ASEAN in regional politics, economics and social affairs; debates on ASEAN roles intra-regionally and internationally; expression of role and function of ASEAN after the end of Cold War. ASEAN and the enhancement of economic, political and social integration; and future of ASEAN.
Course Assignment	:	(1) Each Student is required to submit a written review of five books and five article dealing with ASEAN. The 10 reviews must be handed in on the last day of the class. The mark/grade given will be of 30 percent. (2) A written term paper is required of each student on any subject within the context of ASEAN. It can be political, economic, cultural or social aspects. The length of the paper is about 15 pages long. The mark grade given will be 60 percent. (3) Paper presentation is required of each student before the class ends. About 15 minutes verbal presentation is called for. The mark/grade given will be 10 percent.
